PLYMOUTH CROSSING OPENS AT FASTGATE

Since 1980, Plymouth Housing has been responding to the local area housing crisis with compassion, kindness, and supportive services. Plymouth Housing utilizes the housing first approach to providing for people in crisis. Housing First springs from the idea that when basic needs are met, people are better able to focus on their health and job security. Today, Plymouth is one of the largest providers of low-income housing in downtown Seattle with 1,200 residents and 17 retail tenants in 14 building.

In July, Plymouth Crossing opened on the Eastside. This multifaceted approach to homelessness works in conjunction with a men's shelter operated by PorchLight, formerly Congregations for the Homeless,

and an affordable housing project, currently under construction by <u>Inland</u>
<u>Group</u>, called Polaris.

CONGREGATIONS FOR THE HOMELESS CHANGES ITS NAME TO PORCHLIGHT

Thanks to generous donations made by local businesses and organizations (including a \$200,000 collective donation from The Spring District community partners), Porchlight Eastgate was able to complete construction this year. The new permanent home provides safe shelter, three meals a day, personal care services, as well as access to social service providers. With Plymouth Housing nearby, there are many options available so individuals are able to find the best solution for their particular needs.

The new Eastside men's emergency shelter offers 100 shelter beds, a dining area, and offices for PorchLight staff. The shelter also offers client services addressing mental-health issues, substance-use counseling, and employment counseling. The shelter is equipped to

provide shelter and services to 1,500 men each year. Porchlight is prepared to offer services to help individuals with the services they need at the time they enter the shelter, whether it's a shower or job counseling.

BELLEVUE CELEBRATES A GREEN SUMMER

This summer Bellevue showed up and made a positive impact toward conserving water and recycling paper. Congratulations!

PAPER SHREDDING EVENT UPDATE

This year's paper shredding event doubled recycling! Approximately 33,750 pounds of paper documents were shredded for recycling at the Bellevue shredding event on Saturday, August 19, 2023 - that is more than double what was collected last year! A total of 524 cars of Bellevue residents participated in the event. The confidential documents were shredded on site by Confidential Data Disposal staff. The shredded paper was delivered to International Paper in south King County for recycling.

ZERO WASTE WATER STATIONS UPDATE

To help 4th of July attendees stay hydrated and reduce waste at this year's festivities at the Bellevue Downtown Park, the City of Bellevue offered touchless tap drinking water stations ... it was a heat wave day! 5,000 liters of healthy drinking tap water was consumed thanks to this innovative partnership. This is equivalent to reducing over 10,000 single-use plastic water bottles! Bellevue Utilities invested in this partnership to help protect human health, provide equitable access to safe drinking water, and align with the goal of Zero Waste.



BE CAUTIOUS AS WE GET BACK TO SCHOOL


Arts Without Barriers presents <u>E. Pruitt</u> in The Spring District on Thursday, September 7, 4:00-6:00pm

BUSINESSES ENDING SLAVERY AND TRAFFICKING

In 2012, BEST was formed with the goal of preventing human trafficking.

BEST stands for Businesses Ending Slavery and Trafficking and makes it their mission to not only prevent human trafficking but to provide answers and solutions for those exiting the harmful situation and finding employment. This nonprofit works worldwide to educate people and organizations on how to recognize forced labor and sex trafficking by providing training to the hotel and construction industries, as well as other commercial partners working to create a world that is "inhospitable to human trafficking".

The BEST education programs educate employers on recognizing, reporting, and preventing trafficking. In addition, the individual survivors can participate in training programs that provide employment opportunities and support as they transition to their new life.

By creating training materials and programs, BEST assists industries as they educate their employees about their critical role in recognizing and ending human trafficking in their particular workplace: hospitality, maritime, transit, construction, and other fields.

BEST provides tangible ways society can help assist those in need directly, as well as helping to end human trafficking by interrupting its outlets, such as hotels and workplaces. Support this critical work here!

Apple Streusel Cake

INGREDIENTS

Streusel:

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

3/4 cup brown sugar packed

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup melted butter

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Cake:

2 1/2 cups sliced peeled apples (I used Granny Smith.)

3 tablespoons unsalted butter

3 tablespoons brown sugar packed

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

3/4 cup granulated sugar

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1/4 teaspoon baking soda

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup butter melted

1 egg lightly beaten

1/2 cup buttermilk

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Icing:

1 1/2 cups powdered sugar

1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

Pinch nutmeg

Pinch cloves

Pinch of salt

2-3 tablespoons apple cider





INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat your oven to 350 degrees F. Grease and flour an 8-inch springform pan (or a 9-inch square baking pan).
- 2. Prepare the streusel: stir together the flour, brown sugar, cinnamon, and salt in a medium bowl. Drizzle this mixture with the melted butter and vanilla. Combine with a fork.
- 3. Make the Apple Filling: In a large skillet over medium heat, cook the apples in the 2 tablespoons of unsalted butter for 5-7 minutes or until tender. Stir in the brown sugar. Simmer, uncovered, for about 60 seconds. Remove from the heat and set aside.
- 4. Make the cake batter: In a medium bowl combine the flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. Add the melted butter and mix with a fork until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Make a well in the center of the mixture, add the egg, buttermilk, and vanilla. Stir just until moistened. (The batter will be lumpy.)
- 5. Spread about 1 cup of the batter into the prepared pan. Spoon the apple filling over the batter in an even layer. Sprinkle with 2/3 cups of the streusel mixture. Drop the remaining batter in small mounds onto the filling. Sprinkle with remaining streusel.
- 6. Bake for 40-45 minutes or until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool in the pan on a wire rack for at least 30 minutes.
- 7. Meanwhile, make the icing by whisking together the powdered sugar, spices, salt, and enough apple cider to create a drizzling consistency.
- 8. Serve warm, drizzled with the icing. (The cake is still delicious served at room temperature.)
